## **OSSTF/FEESO Serves Notice of Intent to Bargain**

On Saturday, May 31, AMPA was reconvened in order to discuss and vote on a motion enabling OSSTF to implement a supplementary levy on the membership, should such an action become necessary during the upcoming round of contract negotiations to support strike actions.

Delegates also received an overview of OSSTF's bargaining strategy. Halton teachers will receive a similar overview from Provincial Executive at a General Meeting early in the fall. As part of the normal bargaining process, strike votes will be taken at the provincial and local level later in the fall.

On June 3, OSSTF served notice of intent to bargain following the processes outlined in the School Boards Collective Bargaining Act.

## **Timetabling Look-Fors:**

As timetables for September are firmed up, Branch Presidents and teachers should be aware of the following Article 18 workload provisions:

- 1. Assignment to a stacked class (i.e. a class in which more than one credit programme is being delivered within a period) requires the agreement of the teacher. Hence, school admin should be actively seeking this agreement when such assignments are made and before they are finalized.
- 2. Similarly, assignment to a timetable requiring a teacher to teach three periods in a row requires the agreement of the teacher. Again, admin should be actively seeking this agreement when such assignments are made and before they are finalized.
- 3. Every teacher's timetable should indicate a lunch period and a prep period, as well as instructional periods. The lunch period cannot be the first or last period of the school day.

# **Civics AQ is Politics**

Mutual Agreement Needed Without AQ

The <u>Canadian and World Studies, Grades 9</u> <u>and 10, 2013</u> (Revised) document was released last August and mandatory implementation of the document begins in September 2014.

One significant revision affects staffing and should be brought to members' attention. The Civics course (CHV2O), now called "Civics and Citizenship," is now identified under the heading "**Civics** (**Politics**)" and this means that teachers with Intermediate/Senior Politics (or I/S Political Science) listed on their Certificate of Qualification may now be assigned to teach Civics with no mutual agreement necessary.

Any other general education teacher with divisional qualifications must give mutual agreement to teach Civics. (I have confirmed this information with the Ministry of Education.)

#### **OSSTF Congratulates Wynne**

**(Toronto)** – The Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation (OSSTF/FEESO) is expressing guarded optimism in the wake of the Liberal victory in the recent Ontario provincial election.

"Ontario voters have clearly rejected Tim Hudak's confrontational stance toward unions, public sector workers in general, and education workers in particular," said OSSTF/FEESO President Paul Elliott. "With this in mind, I'd like to congratulate Premier Kathleen Wynne on winning another term in office. We are hopeful that a new mandate for the Liberal government will usher in a renewed commitment away from an austerity agenda and towards investment in Ontario's public education system."

"We have a new bargaining process ahead of us," continued Elliott, referring to the School Boards Collective Bargaining Act which was passed in the spring. Under that Act, a number of major contract items must be the subject of centralized provincial bargaining, while other items will be negotiated between school boards and teachers or support staff at the local level.

Elliott concluded, "We are eager to get this new process underway and we are hoping for fair and respectful discussions when we get to the bargaining table."
